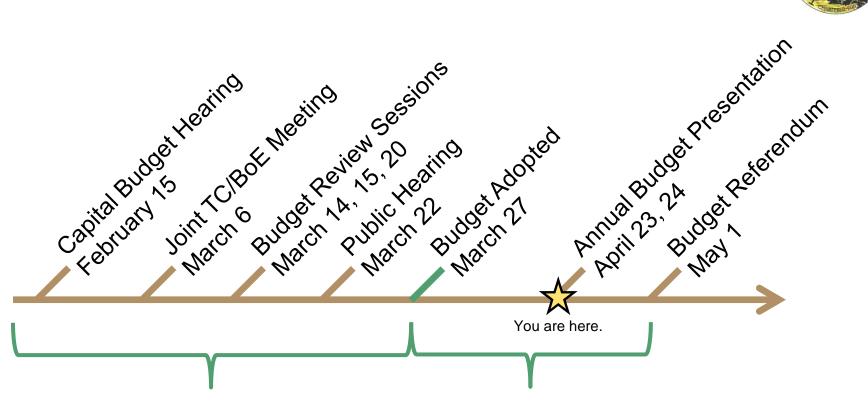

Simple question, but... what is it?



- Funds programs and services for residents
- Sets level of service
- Authorizes necessary spending
- Is executed for less when possible

## **Budget Goals**

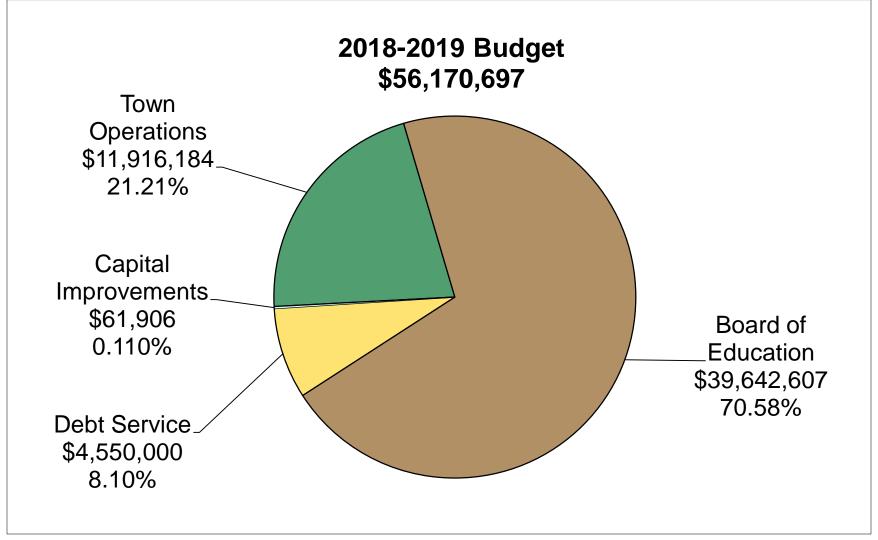


- Maintain or improve services

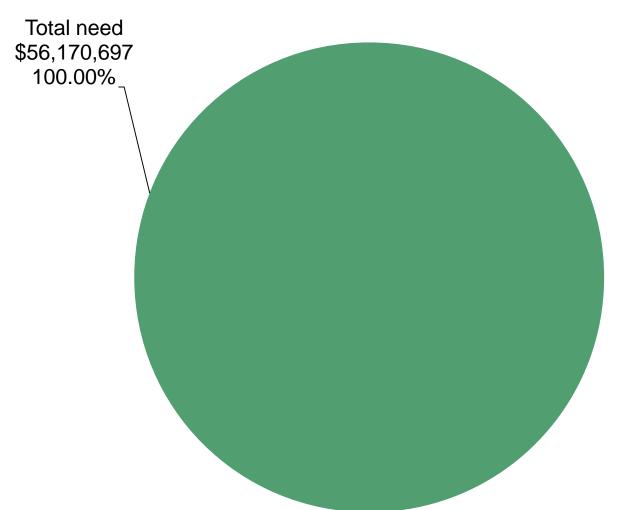
## **Budget Highlights**



- Added back two Resident State Troopers
- Added back one free bulky waste pickup
- Funded full Board of Education request
  - Adds positions for
    - Business teacher, for a future Business Academy
    - Special educator, to keep students in district
    - Math interventionalist, to meet state requirements
    - Science supervisor, to help students prepare for Next Generation Science Standards, reduce attrition
  - Maintains cost avoidance programs like LEAP

## The Budget: Revenues

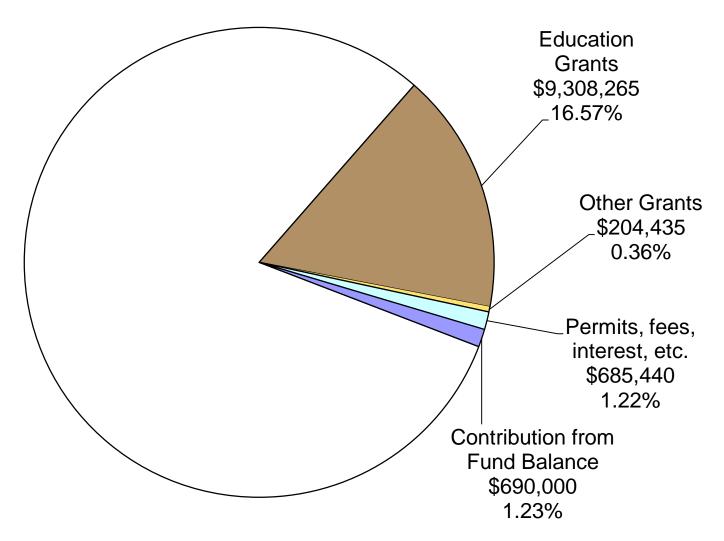
Start with the total need, \$56,170,697

Subtract permits, fees, grants, etc.

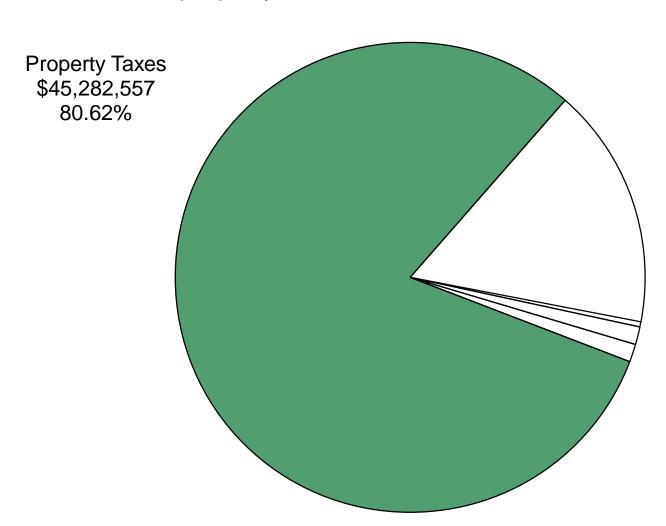




## The Budget: Revenues

## The Problem: Revenue Uncertainty



- Perfect world:
  - State sets budget before we do
  - We know grants before referendum
- Today's world:
  - State may take forever to set budget
  - Grants are guesswork
- Therefore:
  - Manager estimated ECS grant at \$9,308,625
  - Based on last year's actuals and estimate of legislature's budget

## The Problem: Revenue Uncertainty



- Extra funds go into fund balance
- Funds shortage to be negotiated between Board of Education and Town Council

#### Effect on the Mill Rate



Increased spending 0.23 mill

Loss of about 9% in state revenues 0.86 mill

With no fund balance use, mill rate increases 1.40 mills, or 4.07%

With \$690,000 fund balance use, mill rate increases 0.86 mill, or 2.49%

## Services: Maintain or Improve?

#### **Highlights**



#### Increases

- + 2 Resident State Troopers
- + Bulky waste pickup
- + \$152,000 in savings in other areas
- + Four school positions

#### **Decreases**

 High student/teacher ratio in 2<sup>nd</sup> grade

## Taxes: Held at Reasonable?

What's reasonable?



Market Value	2014 Assessment	Taxes at 34.48	Taxes at 35.34	Annual Difference	Monthly Difference
\$167,276	\$117,093	\$4,037	\$4,138	\$101	\$8.42
\$268,979	\$188,285	\$6,492	\$6,654	\$162	\$13.50

#### Taxes: Held at Reasonable?





## Neighboring communities:

- Ellington: +5.36%
- Coventry: +1.25%
- Stafford: too early to tell
- Mansfield: +5.68%
- Vernon: +2.83%
- Willington: -0.07%

(Variation by town from grant estimates, grand list growth)

#### Creditworthiness: Maintained?

#### Too early to tell



- Much greater than normal use: typical is \$150,000 to \$200,000
- Offset by revised fund balance use policy: controls how much can be used and establishes replenishment plan

Have to start somewhere...



#### **Board of Education**

- Implementing LEAP, keeps special needs students in-district (cost avoidance)
- Increasing early intervention (cost avoidance)
- Starting Tolland Business Academy, potentially brings tuition-bearing students (income) and keeps students here (cost avoidance)
- Adding science coordinator to strengthen
   STEM, keep students here (cost avoidance)

Have to start somewhere...



#### **Town Council**

- Examining regionalization opportunities
- Considering alternate policing strategies
- Advocating for homeowners with crumbling foundations

Commercial Real Estate to the rescue!



To make up for \$1,000,000 loss of state aid, Tolland would need:

- 8 Star Hills
- 6 Norwegian Woods
- 2 Big Y Plazas
- 12 CL&P buildings (the big one on Route 74)
   or
- ¼ 300+ apartment complex with hotel and restaurant

#### Efficiency



- Sharing grounds and building maintenance between BoE and Town
- Increasing building energy efficiencies
- Retaining dedicated staff
- Maintaining a mixed volunteer/paid fire department
- Using Resident State Troopers ...and more

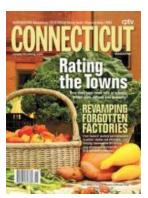
